1st Challenge - Chester 10k on Sunday 12th March (Completed)


2nd Challenge - Liverpool Half Marathon on Sunday 26th March (Completed)

#### Governor News:

In addition to being a member of two subcommittees and the main governing board, over the past half term I have had the privilege of engaging with the school team around a number of activities both supporting school and also receiving support from school and they have given such a broader view and insight to the wider support that school provide to our children other than just classroom curriculum. I have attended the "Parenting for Anxiety" workshops and I would like to thank the school, Mrs Carew and the Inclusion / Well Being Team for putting these sessions on as they have been really valuable and have shown how our school and the Liverpool CAMHS team (https://www.liverpoolcamhs.com/) can work together and deliver support directly into our parent community, helping us support and providing us the tools to help develop our children with such an effective "wrap-around" structure. The sessions have been held in school and have been delivered by the Mental Health Support team from Liverpool CAMHS. They have delivered insight, knowledge and very valuable education around supporting our children suffering with varying forms of anxiety (generalised, social, separation, etc.) They have been delivered directly to parents and personally I have found them to be really powerful and incredibly useful. Being able to tap in to vastly experienced mental health practitioners and learn and practise some of the CBT tools has been such an eye opener.


I have also been able to work with Mr Hawthorne last week when we had 3 teams qualify for the LSSP City Finals with years 4, 5 & 6 all qualifying for the event up at Liverpool FC Academy at Kirkby. Being a few key members of staff down, I was able to provide an extra pair of hands and coach the year 5 team on the day. The event was a real advert for the work that LSSP deliver in partnership with a number of schools and various organisations to enhance PE, sport and physical activity for school children throughout the local area. The event was superbly organised and it was genuinely heart-warming to be able to witness how all our teams, spectators (parents) and staff represented the school not only on a sporting stage but also how they behaved right across the whole event. A massive pat on the back to all who participated, organised and supported the event both on the day and in preparation for the event as a massive amount of unseen work goes into organising, risk assessing, logistical plate spinning etc. any off site event let alone one that ended up spanning 4 year groups. Congratulations to all!

Well done Year 3 for all your hard work this term!









Another fantastic week from Year 5! We would like to say a big well done and thank you to the children for all of their hard work this term; we hope you all have a wonderful Easter break.





Last week, our Votes for Schools topics was 'Will using more artificial intelligence make our life better?'. The pupils considered what the future may hold for artificial intelligence: will using it more improve our lives? What issues might it pose? They also reflected on whether computers should be able to think for themselves and the benefits and drawbacks of this. The assembly asks all voters to consider how much they might want to introduce AI into their average day and the difference it might make to schooling in future. When asked to vote on the question – 'Will using more artificial intelligence make our life better?'. 73.8% of our pupils felt that yes this compares to 36.8% nationally. A big well done to all of the children and some very interesting opinions on an interesting topic!












#### Wonderful Words!

This beautiful new edition celebrates the fifty year anniversary of an adventure that Michael Morpurgo called "The most life-enhancing book you could ever wish to read."


Suppose your country began to change. Suppose that without your noticing, it became dangerous for some people to live in it any longer, and you found, to your surprise, that your own father was one of those people.

This is what happened to Anna in 1933.

Anna is too busy with her schoolwork and tobogganing to listen to the talk of Hitler. But one day she and her brother Max are rushed out of Germany in alarming secrecy, away from everything they know. Their father is wanted by the Nazis. This is the start of a huge adventure, sometimes frightening, very often funny and always exciting.

Judith Kerr wrote When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit fifty years ago, based on her own journey, so that her own children would know where she came from and the lengths to which her parents went to keep her and her brother safe. It has gone on to become a beloved classic that is required reading for many children all over the world and is an unforgettable introduction to the real-life impact of the Second World War. This new paperback edition celebrates fifty years of this extraordinary story.
